If you plan on helping on Saturday please arrive around 8 am. The sale officially starts at 9 but there are always "early birds". Bring something for an informal potluck (check with Joyce first (360-786-1224).

The sale ends at 3 pm and we don't force you to stay all day. But it's always a lot of fun so plan on hanging out.

Directions to 11750 Coyote Ln SW - Littlerock Road south of the firehall. From 113th Avenue SW continue south on Littlerock Road for 0.7 miles, passing Gifford Road on the left. You will see a solid wood fence on the right and Coyote Lane is at the end of that so slow way down and turn in. Joyce is straight ahead through the gate.

Coming north on Littlerock, continue past 123rd Avenue SW and go another 0.7 miles to Coyote Lane on your left. It's 1.2 miles north of downtown Littlerock.

Items will be taken on consignment and the recommended percentage is 15%.

Thank you to everyone who came out on Saturday for our Mima Falls Campground and Trailhead Work Party. Those folks are: Karen Johnson, Barb Follett, Norman Green, Deborah Green, George Gunderson, Diana Gunderson, Susan Hartman, Jeff LaBreck, Judy Francis and Laura Kingman. There were so many of us that many hands made light work. This clean-up effort is important because it prepares the trailhead and campsite for Capitol Forest's opening day on May 1. Since Capitol Riders adopted Mima Falls Trailhead and Campground, this is a nice thing for us to do.

Speaking of opening day, if you haven't ridden much over the winter, remember your pony (and mule) will need to start slow for conditioning. This means short rides building up to longer rides. Mostly walking. Starting one hour and adding small increments of time after that. Just like a bodybuilder can damage themselves by bulking up too quickly, the same is true for our ponies. It takes six weeks of working out lightly for tendons to accrue enough collagen and thus have enough elasticity to hold muscles firmly to bones and to build integrity in tissues and thus reducing the risk of

Capitol Riders meeting minutes
Littlerock Firehall
4/2/13

President Laura Kingman called the meeting to order at 7:03 pm.

Attendees – 28

Guests – Bev and Dick Court (Dick was chapter president 25 years. They joined this evening.) and Rhonda and Emily with mom Leanne (Kristina Dilworth's daughter).

March minutes approved as written in the newsletter.

Treasurer – Traci Koch is stepping down. She has everything in QuickBooks (the chapter owns a copy). The chapter is solvent.

Jeff LaBreck mentioned the new Capitol Forest map is for sale at \$9 per map. The chapter can buy 30 maps for \$4 each and sell to the membership for \$6 each as a fundraiser. Traci Koch made a motion to buy maps and sell for \$7. Motion approved.

Laura asked the group if anyone wanted to be treasurer.

Karen Johnson brought up that the Pierce County chapter prepares lunch at the gravel haul. BCHW loaned \$500 for lunch and would like the chapters to donate to help cover the cost. A motion to donate \$50 was made and approved.

Jeff asked about the garage sale cash. Traci said it comes out of petty cash and in 2011 \$50 was spent on food.

President Laura Kingman presented Jeff LaBreck with his 2013 Cinch Award. The Cinch Award was created in 2011 to recognize individuals who work at the state level. The awardee is nominated by directors and state committee members and recipients are decided on by a state committee. Jeff got his for his calendar sales efforts this past year.

Rendezvous recap – Laura said there were great vendors and the nice chapter table decoration by Sue Koch. There was a saw cutting competition, a Barb Apple clinic, Cascade Mountain Grilling provided fantastic food, and even a tack sale. Karen Johnson took 25 items and sold all but 3. There was a photo competition, a map and compass class, a trail maintenance class and a Haney Meadow fire damage presentation. There was also a great band.

Web site and newsletter – Chris Enrico mentioned that he's put some new interactive maps on the web site like state park boundaries. If you are headed to the beach you need to pay attention to the park boundaries. Twin Harbors State Park includes the beach while Grayland Beach State Park only includes the dunes. Grayland Beach Road (between the two parks) in the vicinity of the restrooms on both sides of the road is also state park land.

Diane Killingsworth mentioned that Ocean Acres Bed and Breakfast has offered to let BCHW members park for free on their property.

Gretchen Shea shared a story with the members – While out for a ride on a trail along the railroad tracks they found a loose horse, a big Paint. They were able to find the owner who hadn't noticed the horse was gone. The owner is Gary Larson who is working on a Veterans therapy riding program as well as a horse rescue.

Activities – Club rides: April 6th is the Nisqually-Mashel ride. Diane said that May 18th is an ORV outing at Elbe (same day as the chapter day ride there). Oakland Bay has a fund ride at Kennedy Creek on May

18th as well.

Carrie Russell said it may rain on Saturday and asked how members would like to be notified. Carrie will let Chris know and he will sent out an email.

Kirsten Dilworth asked about the trails as she has a horse with sensitive feet. Dean Hartman said to use boots. There was further discussion regarding the trails.

Diane mentioned that the Ride to Rendezvous outfitters and guides has their annual event the same weekend as the Beaver Creek camp over. There may be a conflict with the campground.

Peggy Tucker asked about a work party at Mima Falls Campground. Jeff said it has to be April 20 or 21st before Capitol Forest opens. Laura asked the Greens (Norman and Deborah) what date worked for them (new members who want to help with work parties) and they said Saturday. So there will a clean up at Mima Falls Campground on April 20th at 9 am.

Diane said that horse riders lost Mount Rainier National Park since no one spoke up. The Dungeness Wildlife Area is in danger since a horse related accident. Karen said that Yellowstone and the Sierras are also of concern.

Laura said that BCHW had 52,000 volunteer hours in 2012. Please track your preparation time (collecting and loading your tools), travel time, work hours and the time for putting your tools and equipment away as it all counts.

Karen mentioned the gravel haul. It will be on the equine loop on April 13th. It should be a fun day. They need help with loading buckets, lifting buckets onto the animals and spreading the gravel. Snacks and lunch are provided. The work period is 4 hours. Breakfast will be provided by the bicycle community.

Legislative – Dean Hartman thanked those keeping the chapter informed.

Lewis County Chapter basic skills class – Dean said it's too late to register.

Ways and Means – Dean said the garage sale is May 4th. Dean has paid the fee and registered it. Bring your stuff to Joyce's on Friday May 3 starting at 6 pm. Mark your prices and the items do not have to be horse related.

Director's report – Karen Johnson said the report is in the newsletter and on line.

If anyone wants a BCHW cookbook Karen can pick them up for members at the next director's meeting in June.

For the Good of the Order – Cindy McAllister asked about JBLM. Dean said “don't park on the prairie”. Once you have your permit, remember to call in before heading out. Dean said “JBLM loves horse people.” Karen said to report garbage.

There is another Hoover clinic on May 4th and 5th and September 7th and 8th. The Friday night demo is free. Location is the Bordeaux Ranch.

On July 26-28 Ferry County Chapter is hosting a ride on the Old Stage Trail out of Colville. (A remaining segment of the first state highway in Washington, this trail is the only wagon trail in the forest trail system.) Chapter web site is not current so no additional information.

Some of the chapter rides have been moved around. With Mount Adams Horse Camp not having any real trail access this spring/summer due to the 2012 Cascade Creek wildfire (on the southern slopes of the mountain) both Beaver Creek and Indian Camp camp overs have been moved. Beaver Creek in the Methow is now scheduled for June 26th to 30th. Indian Camp in the Teanaway north of Cle Elum is moved to August 1st through 4th. Refer to last months newsletter for the remainder of this years rides.

Contact Jeff LaBreck at 360-264-7901 if you want to purchase a copy of the new DNR map for Capitol Forest. Cost is \$7.00 with the profits going to the chapter. This beats the single copy rate from DNR which is \$9.00 per copy.

No word on plans for the Haney Meadows restoration after the massive wildfire this past summer. I'm sure that we'll be hearing more later this spring after the snow melts and folks can get in for a proper look at the trail situation. We already know about the damage to the camp itself. If you've never been there but want to help, stay tuned in.

Speaking of Indian Camp in the Teanaway, the state legislature has been working on a proposal to purchase the American Forest Land Company lands (50,000 plus acres). One of the things needing to be worked out is whether the land would be administered by DNR or WDFW. Representative Judy Warnick is leading the charge.

On May 18th there is a scheduled chapter day ride at Elbe Hills (Nicholson Trail System - Sahara Creek Horse Camp). On this same day Oakland Bay chapter is hosting a fun ride at Kennedy Creek.

On May 23rd to 27th the chapter heads to the Nile and the "Old Sawmill Site" for a camp over. And yes, there was a sawmill there. You can see the concrete foundations.

June 1st is National Trails Day. We should hear of the chapter's plans for a work party in Capitol Forest at the general meeting on May 7th.

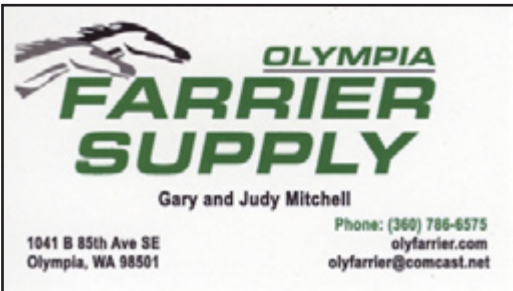
